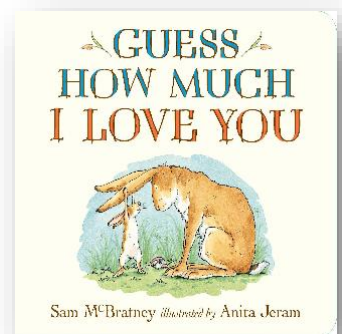

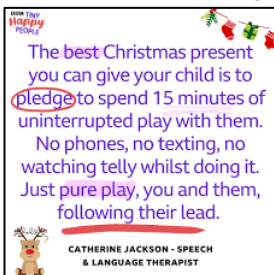

### Enrichment Activities

#### Year 1 Church Trip



Year 1 enjoyed a visit to St Johns Church, where they learned about the Nativity story and how Christians celebrate Advent and Christmas. The children took part in discussions about Jesus and why he is special, before joining in with a song complete with actions. #### Pause Day - Advent



Each half term, we take time for a special Pause Day, where the children are encouraged to slow down, reflect, and enjoy calm, meaningful moments during the school day.

This half term, our Pause Day focused on Advent. The children explored what Advent means, why it is a time of waiting and preparation, and how we can create space for reflection as we prepare for Christmas. As part of this, the children created a craft linked to the theme of Advent, which gave them the opportunity to express their understanding creatively.



The children also enjoyed sharing their work and learning with one another, talking about their ideas and listening thoughtfully to others. It was a lovely opportunity to celebrate reflection, creativity, and communication. We are very proud of how the children engaged with this Pause Day and thank you for your continued support.





### Time Together Group: Young Carers



This term our young carers have been getting together and sharing the space to connect and simply enjoy themselves. Throughout each session there is a sense of group morale with each of the children supporting each other and sharing in laughter. They build meaningful friendships and have looked forward to the activities that have given them the opportunity to unwind from their caring responsibilities.



### Time Together Resettlement Group



Walton Oak have welcomed Barbara, Louise and Anita from Elevate Life, into school this term, to support our resettlement community by giving them the time and space to feel valued and have a sense of belonging.

The children have embraced this opportunity and engage in various activities including mindfulness and craft activities. We welcomed their parents into our most recent session so that they could be a part of sharing in this experience. The children decorated cupcakes and gifted them to their parents.

## Diversity and Equality

### Acts of Kindness: Inspiration – Lizzie Velasquez



In Monday's assembly the children learnt about Lizzie Velasquez is an inspiring example of how kindness, courage, and advocacy can transform lives. Born with a rare congenital condition that prevents her from gaining body fat, Lizzie has a protected characteristic of disability. She has faced bullying and public scrutiny from a young age, yet she chose to respond with positivity, compassion, and a commitment to helping others.





Lizzie is now a motivational speaker and author, spreading messages of kindness, self-acceptance, and empathy. She encourages people to "choose kindness" every day, showing that our actions and words can profoundly impact those around us.

For our school community, Lizzie Velasquez's story reminded us that:

- Kindness includes standing up for yourself and others in the face of cruelty.
- Words and actions can either harm or uplift—choosing the latter has power.
- Resilience and compassion can inspire and support those who feel different or isolated.

We spoke about how her example encourages us to cultivate a culture of kindness in school, modelling respect, inclusion and encouragement for every child and colleague.



The children thought about how they can spread kindness within their own communities and heard about a charity called "Small acts of kindness" who have been busy giving out bags containing warm blankets, hot drinks and warm socks to elderly and vulnerable people to help them keep warm during the cold winter months.

**This a 10 week programme designed to offer strategies for guiding children buy focusing on four core building blocks: self awareness, appropriate expectations, empathy and positive discipline**

#### What the program covers

- Understanding child behaviour: Learning to interpret what your child's actions and emotions mean.
- Listening and communication: Developing better ways to talk and listen to your children.
- Praise and guidance: Understanding the power of encouragement and positive reinforcement.
- The power of play: Recognizing the importance of play for development.
- Boundaries and parenting styles: Exploring different approaches to setting limits and managing behavior.
- Self-care: Recognizing the importance of looking after yourself as a parent.

#### Core concepts

- Self-awareness: Understanding your own feelings and how they influence your parenting.
- Appropriate expectations: Having realistic expectations for your child's development and behavior.
- Empathy: Developing an understanding of your child's feelings and perspective.
- Positive discipline: Learning effective strategies for setting boundaries and guiding behaviour in a constructive way.

**The programme will be run 1 day a week for a period of 10 weeks. Although it is best to attend all 10 sessions we understand that this is not always possible.**
