

Yesterday evening, we held our autumn Local Governing Body (LGB) meeting. Our Governing Body consists of Trust appointed and parent governors who provide the leaders in our school with support and challenge in order to achieve the very best for our children. Throughout the autumn term, governors have regularly attended a range of monitoring visits to quality assure the actions we are taking as leaders. The visits included:

- Observations of maths lessons to evidence the impact that the structure of the lessons are having on children's learning outcomes.
- A learning walk to explore how we ensure children have a sense of belonging at Walton Oak in order for them to feel safe and happy about coming to school.
- Observations of a range of lessons to identify how teachers use assessment in lessons to ensure all children make progress.
- A visit to quality assure the provision in the Early Years and Foundation Stage (Nursery and Reception) and the impact our new, improved outdoor learning spaces are having.
- Learning walks to evidence the impact so far, of the Oracy Project.
- A safeguarding audit.

In our meeting yesterday, we discussed all the findings from the visits and celebrated the positive assurances that the governors gave around what they had seen and heard in classrooms and from leaders. We also discussed the actions in place to ensure that we are continually supporting our team with developing their practice and driving the school forward. I am grateful for the committed team of governors we have at Walton Oak and the insight and expertise they bring to their roles.

This was the last meeting for two of our governors, whose term of office has come to an end. Ceri Orrell and Emily Oliphant have been governors at Walton Oak for the past four years and have supported and guided the school's journey through Covid and leadership changes. I am particularly grateful for the support they have provided me with during my first year here. I would like to thank them both for the time they have given, voluntarily to the role of governor at our school. I know they will continue to be part of our journey as parents within our school community.

We now welcome Yash Senturk who has been Trust appointed as a new governor at Walton Oak. Yash joined yesterday's meeting and is keen to get to know our school and the community through the upcoming monitoring visits next term. The visits will continue to quality assure teaching and learning and will also have a behaviour and personal development focus in the spring term.

Today, our House Captain campaigns took place. I am so very proud of all the children in year 2 and 6 who demonstrated our Walton Oak Way of being courageous by bravely putting themselves forward to run election campaigns. Mrs Bourne, who has led on this has provided further information below. We don't yet have the final outcome, but I know that every child should hold their head up high and feel reassured that they did an excellent job. The names of the new House Captains will be revealed on Monday.

#### **Fundraising**

Thank you to everyone who has contributed towards our recent fundraising events. It is important to us to support local and national charities. Our children also benefit from learning about and having a positive impact on the lives of others in their wider community, as well as getting lots of enjoyment from the activities they participate in. **Our recent mufti day raised £318.75** for the Stripy Stork and Walton Charities Christmas appeal which will help ensure that children living in poverty across Elmbridge have a gift to open on Christmas day. #### Considerate Parking

We regularly remind our children about being respectful and safe at school. Being respectful is one of our Walton Oak Way values. Can we please ask parents to be the same when parking outside or near to the school. The new zebra crossing and zig zag road markings have been a welcome addition to Ambleside Avenue as they ensure the road is clear and most importantly, <u>safe</u> for our children and families when they arrive at and leave the school site. However, a number of people have started to park across the road markings and on the zig zag lines which represent 'NO PARKING' at any time. This restricts the motorist and pedestrian views of the whole road and could cause an increased risk of an accident occurring. Can I also ask that the same respect is given to the Glendale Care home nearby. Parents have been parking in or across their car park. Like a school, Glendale houses vulnerable people. Their families and medical staff are regularly coming and going and need to be able to park in the provided spaces and have clear access to the road. Thank you in advance for your cooperation here.

#### **Pastoral News**

#### Tips on behaviour management



**Praise as much as possible.** Remember there is praise for doing and praise for being. For example: "thank you for putting your bag away. That was really helpful" or, "that was a lovely thing to say/do, you are very kind." If you have a very difficult day with your child, praise can be particularly hard, so before they go to sleep tell them that you love them and comment on something personal to them, such as having a lovely smile.

**Use thank you instead of please when giving an instruction which your child may not want to follow**. For example: "pick up your coat, thank you". "Please", makes your instruction sound like a request. If you are not giving them a choice about picking up their coat then "Thank you" is respectful but assertive.

**Adopt a no shouting rule, for the <u>whole</u> family:** If one of you shouts, then you have consequences. If you follow this rule, then you get a reward.

**Use a point chart or sticker chart for younger children (and even some older ones):** Decide what behaviour you want to see and give out points/stickers when your child does what you have asked without any arguments. If you agree to your child earning 10 points or stickers over a period of time, i.e a week, then by the end of the week they can have a reward. This can be something that you would do anyway as a family, for example watching a movie and having pizza for tea, but let your child choose.


#### Anti-Bullying Week



Over the past two weeks children have been taking part in lessons to understand what bullying is and how we can stand up to it together. We have spent time thinking about Kindness and how we can make our school a kind place.

To help us understand and discuss ways that we can stand up to bullying, we used the story 'One' by Kathryn Otoshi. This is a multi-layered book that allowed children from Nursery through to Year 6 to engage with the topics around bullying and being kind to one another. Every child took part in a writing activity based off of the story, some children created newspaper articles, others a comic strip and some created posters.

Our Pupil Parliament met this week to consider ways that we can truly make sure everyone at Walton Oak has an understanding of what bullying is and the steps we can take to stop it. We will be keeping you updated as we continue to work on this.



Measles symptoms include: high fever; sore, red, watery eyes; coughing; aching and feeling generally unwell; a blotchy red brown rash, which usually appears after the initial symptoms.

If you have symptoms of measles, stay at home and phone your GP or NHS 111 for advice. STAY AWAY from GP surgeries and A&E departments – you could spread the illness to others.

- measles outbreaks happen when not enough children have been vaccinated
- measles can be a very serious disease, leading to ear and chest infections, fits, diarrhoea, and damage to the brain.
   Measles can kill
- your child is at risk of measles if he or she hasn't had the MMR vaccination
- 2 doses of MMR vaccine are needed to get the best protection

- if your child is due to have had 2 doses of MMR but has not yet received them, no matter what age they are, you should contact your GP to get them vaccinated as soon as possible\*
- if you can't remember if your child has had any, 1 or 2 doses of MMR vaccine, check his or her personal child health record (the Red Book). If this doesn't help, speak to your GP
- if you don't know how many doses your child has had, it's better to have 2 doses of MMR vaccine now rather than risk leaving them unprotected

\*In response to a local outbreak then the 2 doses can be given one month apart from the age of 18 months.

# Answers to some common questions about measles and the MMR vaccine

# Why are we seeing these outbreaks of measles?

Measles is a highly infectious disease, spreading quickly from person to person, especially in schools. A child with measles will infect almost all unprotected children they have contact with. Since the end of 2017 there has been an increase in measles globally which has affected the UK. This has resulted in some spread into wider communities, in particular in undervaccinated groups.

# When are the MMR vaccinations usually given?

The best times are between 12 and 13 months of age and again at 3 years and 4 months, with one dose on each occasion. But, if your child wasn't vaccinated then, they can be vaccinated at any age with 2 doses one month apart.

# Will there be any side effects to the vaccination?

Your child may get the symptoms of measles, mumps and rubella for up to 6 weeks after the vaccination but in a very much milder form. This proves that the vaccine is working and your child is building up resistance to future contact with the viruses that cause the 3 diseases. Not all children show these symptoms but that doesn't mean the vaccine isn't working.

# Should parents in outbreak areas get vaccinated against measles?

As with many diseases, once you have had measles, you don't catch it again because you have built up a natural resistance to it. So, if you've had measles or 2 doses of MMR vaccine you do not need to get vaccinated now.
