What are the assessments?

- Statutory Assessment Tests (SATs)
- The tests are carried out by all children in Year 6 across the country in the same week in May (Week commencing 13th May)
- The assessments are based on everything the children have learnt across their time in KS2
- Tests are given in Maths and Reading
- There is also a Grammar, Spelling and Punctuation test which forms part of the children's overall level in English
- Writing and Science are teacher assessed over the course of the year



- End of year report July
- Print out of information showing whether end of year expectation has been met or not in Maths, Reading and Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling.
- Writing will be assessed through Teacher
 Assessments as well as Science and the foundation subjects.





How will the tests be administered?

- The tests are administered in the most relaxed and familiar way possible
- Children take the tests in the classroom or suitable rooms in school
- Children are invited into school from 8.10am each day during the official week to have breakfast together to give them a calm start to the day and to allow any issues/questions to be addressed promptly by staff



How are we supporting your child?

- Revision practice children are already regularly exposed to similar practice questions in the classroom
- Booster classes and Tutoring sessions are to target children who may need to receive extra sessions in Maths and/or Literacy in addition to their whole class lessons. Booster classes and tutoring sessions have started; some may be held before or after school. Parents are contacted individually re. these sessions.
- We do frequent data analysis to allow us to keep up to date with exactly where the children are.
- Supporting each other lots of paired and group work to give each other feedback and learn from one another
- Homework increase in homework for Y6 children and using the CGP SATs busters books





How are we supporting your child?

- We will prepare the children by running 'mock' assessment weeks, leading up to the actual week – our first one after Easter!
- We will be using previous KS2 SATs papers and a range of other sample papers that have been carefully produced in line with the 2014 curriculum and End of KS2 expectations.
- We will be doing papers from 2019, 2022 and 2023.
